
November Newsletter 2025



Friendly Reminders:

After window cleaning or releasing the locks/clips to remove the sash, please ensure the window sash is fully pushed back into place and securely locked.

- ♣ Do not remove or disconnect the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors from the ceiling for any reason. Please always contact the office if there is a problem with your smoke detectors. It is a safety hazard and a liability to both you and your neighbors to not have them connected. Please ensure your batteries are in working order. Safety First Always!
- Please note that visitor parking is strictly reserved for guests only; members are not permitted to use these spaces. We kindly ask for your cooperation in following these procedures to avoid ticketing and to help maintain fair use of parking for all residents and their visitors.
- A very friendly reminder that your housing charges are due on or before the first of the month. You have the option to pay via Cheque, PAP or Tenant Pay. If you have not decided and would like more information, please contact the office.

Parking Update - Enforcement Measures

Parking enforcement is now in effect. All members must ensure vehicles are registered and display a valid permit at all times. Guest vehicles must be registered through the EZ Permit system, and visitor parking is for guests only.

Please note: permits activate upon registration and expire at 11:00 AM on the selected end date — think of them as operating on an 11:00 AM to 11:00 AM window.



Thanks to all the members and friends that came out for this special community event, hopefully this is the beginning of something that will continue and ultimately bring healing and unity to our community.



A Quick History of Halloween in Canada

Let's rewind. Halloween, as we know it, has its roots in the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain. Pronounced "sow-win", this celebration marked the end of the harvest, the boundary between summer and winter, and when the world of the living and the dead turned thin.

Over time, with the spread of Christianity, All Saints' Day, celebrated on November 1, and All Souls' Day on November 2, absorbed some of those customs, and the evening before, October 31, became All Hallows' Eve, which eventually developed into the Halloween we celebrate today.



How Canadians Celebrate Halloween Across the country, you'll find many of the classic elements:

- Costumes: Kids and even adults dress up as everything from monsters, witches, and ghosts to superheroes, pop-culture icons, and animals.
- Trick-or-treating: The door-to-door tradition is very much alive. Kids say, "Trick or Treat," and neighbours hand out candy.
- Pumpkin carving: The tradition comes from the older custom of carving turnips or root vegetables in Europe. However, here in North America, pumpkins became the go-to once settlers saw how well they worked.
- Decorations and parties: Homes take on spooky looks, neighbourhoods light up, community events take place, adult costume parties pop up, and haunted houses or eerie attractions are common.

What's great is that while Halloween is national, each province and territory adds its own flavour. Whether you're in the north, the Atlantic coast, the prairies, or the West coast, there are local traditions celebrated at Halloween across Canada.

- Newfoundland & Labrador: The age-old tradition of mummering is still alive in some places. People in disguises, mummers, go from house to house, perform little skits or dances, and are welcomed with treats or a drink. While often celebrated during the Christmas season, mummering is also celebrated at Halloween.
- Ontario / Maritimes: Lantern-lit walks, porch displays, and ghost tours are popular this week; some places also use the nickname "Mischief Night."
- British Columbia: On the West Coast, you'll find haunted corn mazes, forest-based spooky events, and a strong link to Indigenous legends spun into the Halloween season.
- Prairie Provinces: Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta: Rural pumpkin patches, haunted farm-rides, and community fairs are common around this time.
- Quebec: With its deep historic roots, Old Quebec and other districts lean into the spooky past and ghost walks.
